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Outstanding berry grilled cheese

Grilled cheese is a beloved comfort food that can be enjoyed any time of the day. Although there isn't much that needs to be added to cheese to make it delicious, the inclusion of tart strawberries and blackberries in this recipe titled "The Sweet Sheep Grilled Cheese" from "The Reading Terminal Market Cookbook" (Camino Books) by Ann Hazan and Irina Smith pushes this sandwich over the edge of deliciousness. An additional cookie butter spread and chocolate chips makes this grilled cheese much more dessert than lunch, and can be an indulgent treat anyone can enjoy.

The Sweet Sheep Grilled Cheese (Makes 5 servings)

2 cups Valley Shepherd whipped sheep milk ricotta

1 cup mascarpone cheese

10 slices soft brioche sandwich bread

3/4 cup blackberry jam

of the straightful cup hulled and diced strawberries

1 cup diced peaches

1/2 cup cleaned blackberries, cut into quarters

cup miniature semisweet chocolate chips cup speculoos cookie butter (see note)

1/2 cup softened unsalted butter

In a bowl, mix together ricotta and mascarpone.
On a clean, dry surface, lay out five slices of the brioche.
Spread equal parts blackberry jam on each slice. Place a large spoonful of the mascarpone ricotta mix on top of jam (it may be helpful to use a piping bag) until all the mixture is used.
Evenly divide strawberries, peaches, blackberries and chocolate chips among each slice. Spread the speculoos cookie butter on the remaining five slices of brioche and place on top of the first

Spread the softened butter in a thin layer on the outer parts of the brioche. Grill in either a panini press or in a hot pan. Slice and serve hot.

Note: If speculoos is too hard to find, here's how to make it.
Place 2 cups of ginger snaps in the bowl of a food processor
and blend to very fine crumbs. Add 4 tablespoons of softened
unsalted butter, and process until a smooth paste forms
(similar to consistency of peanut butter). Refrigerate leftover
portion and bring to room temperature when using.

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
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Did you know?

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

Leap into these Leap Year facts

Leap Year typically takes place every four years. The process of adding a day to the calendar every four years was designed to realign the clock and calendar more closely with how long it takes the Earth to rotate around the sun, which is slightly longer than the 365 days attributed to a year. If not for Leap Year, the seasons would slowly shift out of place. There are many interesting facts to learn about Leap Year, and February 29 is the perfect time to explore them.

- It takes the Earth 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 45 seconds to circle once around the sun, says Time and Date. Without leap years, we'd lose almost six hours every year. After a century, the calendar would be off by nearly 24 days.
- Despite 2100, the next turn of the century, being divisible by four, it will not be a leap year. That's because it is divisible by 100 but not 400, which means it will not be a leap year. This exception to the rule pertains to new century years.
- ~ Forbes reports that it's likely the calendar will need to be changed again since the Earth's rotation rate, the axial tilt orientation and the Earth's orbital motion around the sun is not constant. Various effects, such as earthquakes and something called tidal braking, affect the passage of time.
- ~ Legend states that on February 29 it is alright for a woman to propose to a man, a custom attributed to St. Bridget. Bridget complained to St. Patrick that some women had to wait too long for their suitors to pop the question. As the legend goes, Patrick supposedly provided women this day to propose to compensate.
- ~ Some cultures view February 29 as an unlucky day. In Greece, couples are warned against planning weddings during leap years. In Italy, the phrase, "Anno biseto, anno funesto" ("leap year, doom year") is uttered.
- ~ Individuals who are born on February 29th are known as leaplings or leapers.
- ~ Leap Day is not considered a legal day. Those who are leaplings have to choose February 28 or March 1 for their official and legal birthdays.
- ~ Individuals who are paid fixed monthly incomes often work for free on February 29th because their wages will not be calculated to include the extra day.
- ~ Guinness World Records indicates the only family it could verify as producing three consecutive generations born on leap days belongs to the Keoghs. The elder Patrick Anthony Keogh was born in 1940, his son Peter Eric was born in 1964, and his granddaughter Bethany in 1996.

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Simple ways to cut cancer risk

Cancer affects people from all walks of life. According to the World Cancer Research Fund International, there were an estimated 18.1 million cancer cases around the world in 2020, and the breakdown was almost even among men (9.3 million) and women (8.8 million). Great strides have been made in cancer research in the twenty-first century, and that has led to countless lives being saved. Cancer prevention strategies are another potentially lifesaving tool in the fight against the disease. A significant percentage of cancer deaths could be prevented in fact, the Prevent Cancer Foundation reports that research indicates about 50 percent of cancer deaths are preventable with the knowledge individuals have today. Perhaps the most comforting aspect of cancer prevention is that many of the strategies that can reduce instances of the disease are simple. That means



individuals won't have to go to great lengths to include these strategies in their approach to cancer prevention.

- ~ Avoid tobacco. The link between tobacco use and cancer has been known for a long time, and the good news is the message touting the importance of avoiding tobacco is working. The American Cancer Society reports that cigarette smoking rates had reached his toric lows in 2019. While that's great news, it might not tell the whole story, as consumers now have many other ways to use tobacco, each of which have been linked to cancer. So it's not simply avoiding cigarettes, but also cigars, hookahs, chewing tobac co, vaping products, and more, that is necessary to reduce cancer risk.
- ~ Shield your skin from the sun. The PCF notes that exposure to the sun's ultraviolet rays causes the most skin cancers. The WCRFI reports that melanoma of the skin is the thirteenth most common cancer in men and the fifteenth most common cancer in women across the globe. Protecting the skin from the sun is as simple as applying a sunscreen with a minium sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 and covering up when spending long periods of time in the sun. The PCF urges individuals to avoid tanning beds and protect their skin year-round, including in winter.
- Utilize fruits and vegetables in your fight against cancer. The popularity of plant-based diets is on the rise. In fact, retail sales of plant-based foods in the United States increased by 11 percent in a single year between 2018 and 2019, according to data from the Plant Based Foods Association. A greater reliance on plant-based diets could go a long way toward reducing cancer deaths, as the PCF notes a 2021 study found that three servings of vegetables and two servings of fruit each day reduced the risk of cancer death by 10 percent.
- ~ Avoid excessive alcohol consumption. The PCF notes that alcohol has been linked to cancers of the breast, liver, esophagus, and colon. When consuming alcohol, women are urged to limit their consumption to one drink or fewer each day, while men should limit their consumption to two or fewer alcoholic beverages per day. The science is simple: the more alcohol a person drinks, the greater his or her risk for cancer.

Cancer prevention is a vital component of a healthy lifestyle, and there are many simply ways people can cut their cancer risk.

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

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The nutritional benefits of sweet potatoes



40 grams fresh herbs, such as coriander, flat-leaf parsely, mint and/or dill, chopped Sea salt and black pepper

For the black bean salsa:


240 grams canned black beans, drained and rinsed

tablespoons sun-dried tomato paste
 grams cherry tomatoes, chopped

Juice of 1/2 lime

4 tablespoons fresh mint, shredded

1/2 teaspoon sea salt flakes
Pinch of chili flakes



To make the black bean salsa, add all the ingredients to a bowl and stir to combine.

To serve, load two bowls with the rice mixture, black bean salsa, sugar snaps, and sliced avocado.







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






Did you know?

The hormone cortisol can affect individuals' vulnerability to heart disease. Cherry Pie Bars (Yield: One 9-by-13-inch pan)

2 cups sugar

1 cup butter, softened

4 eggs

cups all-purpose flourteaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 21-ounce can cherry pie filling

Preheat oven to 350 F. Line a 9-by-13-inch pan with parchment paper.

In a stand mixer, or with a hand mixer, cream sugar and butter on low. Add the eggs one at a time. Beat until just combined. Add the flour, baking powder and salt. Spread a little over half the cake batter into the pan. Evenly spread the pie filling over the top, and spoon the rest of the cake batter over the pie filling. It's fine if the cherries show through.

Bake 35 minutes or until the top has turned slightly golden. Do not overbake. Allow to cool and slice into squares. Enjoy!






Did you know?


Sweet potatoes and yams may seem similar but they are not one and the same. Even though the names for these foods are used interchangeably, yams and sweet potatoes actually are two distinct foods. Yams and sweet potatoes differ in flavor and appearance and come from different plant families. Sweet potatoes are in the morning glory family while yams are from the lily family. Yams are starchier, harder and not as sweet as sweet potatoes. Their texture is more reminiscent of traditional potatoes or yuca. Yams will have black or brown skin that is barklike in appearance with white or purple flesh. Yams can grow quite large, even up to 100 pounds. Conversely, sweet potatoes are sweeter, softer and more fibrous than yams. They also can come in a variety of colors of both the skin and flesh. Sweet potatoes only grow to be a few ounces in size. While you cannot use a yam as a substitute for a sweet potato, there are some sweet potatoes that are not as sweet and may replace yams in recipes. Stores don't seem to recognize the distinction between yams and sweet potatoes. In fact, the next time you go to a store and see yam on a sign in the produce section, it is likely a sweet potato.

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Did you know?

Dental issues are a cause of concern for pet owners. The Cornell Richard P. Riney Canine Health Center says periodontal disease is one of the most common health issues in veterinary medicine. Studies show that 80 to 90 percent of dogs over the age of three have some type of periodontal disease, even if the pet's teeth look clean. The Veterinary Oral Health Council says there are certain commercial pet foods and water additives that are designed to minimize the formation of plaque on pets' teeth that can lead to periodontal disease. However, once plaque is present, only a professional cleaning can remove it, as brushing and food/treats alone will not address the condition.

Conditions that can affect pets' oral health

A happy and healthy pet can be a wonderful addition to a home. The unconditional love that companion animals provide is often well worth the devotion of time and resources that goes into ensuring pets live happy and healthy lives.

Oral health care is one of the common areas of pet health that some pet parents overlook, but it is just as important as other wellness issues. The American Veterinary Medical Association advises that dental health is a very important part of pets' overall health. Dental problems can cause certain issues, or they can be a byproduct of other health problems. Understanding some of the conditions that can affect pets' teeth and gums may compel their owners to take swift action if such issues arise.

Gum diseases

Bacterial infections of the gums and other oral tissue can cause inflammation of the gums. If periodontal disease is untreated, Merck Veterinary Manual says tooth loss can occur.

Gum disease is caused by bacteria that leads to the formation of plaque at the gum line. Pet owners should be diligent in brushing their pets' teeth to reduce bacteria. Eating crunchy foods and treats alone will not clean teeth. Veterinarians also may recommend routine dental scaling treatments, particularly for breeds that are at elevated risk for periodontal disease.



Broken teeth and roots

Broken teeth and roots are most often caused when pets bite into something that is too hard. The Cornell Richard P. Riney Canine Health Center says pet owners should employ the "fingernail test" on pet toys. In this test, one should be able to make a dent in the item with a fingernail to mark it as safe as a chew toy. Antlers, hooves and bones may fracture teeth. Pets also should not be allowed to chomp down on ice cubes.

Teeth also may become fractured through rough play, such as a tug-of-war session with a toy. Pet owners should carefully gauge the pressure at which they play such games.

Tumors

Oral tumors are abnormal growths that can form in pets' mouths. Some tumors are benign, while others are malignant and can spread. All unusual growths should be checked out by a veterinarian. VCA Animal Hospitals says male dogs seem to be twice as likely to develop oral cancer than female dogs. Also, Akitas, Cocker Spaniels, Boxers, Dachsunds, Doberman Pinschers, Golden Retrievers, and Poodles are among the breeds that seem to be predisposed to oral cancers.

Bad breath

The most common cause of bad breath in pets is periodontal disease. Having pets' teeth cleaned and staying current on oral hygiene can help.

Additional causes of bad breath may include poor kidney or liver health, as the pet may be having issues filtering waste out of its body, says Apple Valley Animal Hospital.

Routine vet visits can alert pet owners to potential oral health issues. Taking dental care seriously can help keep pets healthy.



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
