





Did you know?

Five-year survival rates for prostate cancer are notably high. Johns Hopkins Medicine notes that approximately 80 to 85 percent of all prostate cancers are detected in the local or regional stages, which plays a significant role in improving survival rates for the disease. Johns Hopkins notes that many men diagnosed with prostate cancer and treated at the local or regional stages are cancer-free after five years. Indeed, the American Cancer Society reports that the five-year survival rates for localized and regional

prostate cancers was greater than 99 percent. Localized indicates there is no evidence that the cancer has spread beyond the prostate, while regional means it has spread to nearby structures or lymph nodes. The high survival rates for local and regional prostate cancers underscore the effectiveness of screening for the disease. The ACS recommends men who are at average risk for prostate cancer discuss screening with their physicians at age 50, while those at high risk should open such a dialogue at age 45. Men at very high risk, which includes individuals with a firstdegree relative who had prostate cancer at an early age, should discuss screening upon reaching age 40. When prostate cancer has spread to other parts of the body, the five-year survival rate is 34 percent.





Did you know?

According to Worldwide Cancer Research, an organization that helps to supply funding to pioneering cancer research, blood cancers are the fifth most common types of cancers across the globe. The American Society of Hematology notes that blood cancers affect the production and function of blood cells. When a person is diagnosed with blood cancer, oftentimes his or her normal blood cell development process is interrupted by the uncontrolled growth of an abnormal type of blood cell. The ASH reports that leukemia, lymphoma and myeloma are the three main types of blood cancers. Leukemia is marked by the rapid production of abnormal white blood cells. Lymphocytes are a type of white blood cell that fights infection. Lymphoma occurs when abnormal lymphocytes become lymphoma cells and multiply in the lymph nodes and other tissues. Over time, lymphoma cells impair the immune system, making individuals vulnerable to infections and other adverse health outcomes. Myeloma is a cancer of the plasma cells, which the ASH NOTES are typically responsible for producing disease- and infection-fighting antibodies. Myeloma prevents the normal production of those antibodies, leaving patients vulnerable to infection

Enjoy this recipe for "Kentucky 'Nanners Foster Waffles" from "Lord Honey Traditional Southern Recipes with a Country Bling Twist" (Pelican Publishing) by Chef Jason Smith.

Kentucky 'Nanner Foster Waffles (Serves 4 to 6)

	Nonstick cooking spray	Topping:	
2	cups all-purpose flour	1/4	cup butter
1/4	cup white sugar	1/4	cup brown sugar, packed
1	tablespoon baking powder	1/4	teaspoon ground cinnamon
1	teaspoon salt	1/4	teaspoon ground nutmeg
2	eggs	2	bananas, sliced thick
11/2	cups milk, any variety	3	teaspoons bourbon
1/2	cup butter, melted and cooled		Favorite vanilla ice cream
2	teaspoons vanilla		
1/2	teaspoon ground cinnamon		



Preheat a waffle iron, and spray with nonstick cooking spray. Preheat oven to 170 F. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt.

In a small bowl, whisk the eggs and milk. Add the butter, vanilla, and cinnamon, and whisk.

Add the wet mixture to the dry, and whisk until there are no lumps.

Scoop 1/2 cup batter onto the waffle iron, close the lid, and let cook until golden brown and crispy. Repeat until all the batter is gone.

Put the waffles on a sheet pan and place in preheated oven.

To make the topping, melt the butter in a medium skillet over medium heat. Add the brown sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg, stir to combine, and cook for about 1 minute.

Add the sliced bananas and cook for a few seconds. Add the bourbon (or apple juice, instead), and cook 2 to 3 minutes, stirring often with a light hand so the bananas do not break up.

Meanwhile, place 1 to 2 waffles on a plate and top with a scoop of ice cream. Once banana sauce has thickened, spoon over ice cream and waffles. Repeat with remaining waffles.

Tips to take care of your skin

As the body's largest organ, skin is of the utmost importance to overall health. The skin protects against germs, regulates body temperature and enables tactile sensations, says the Cleveland Clinic. Despite those vital functions, skin is easily overlooked in health care regimens.

Even though the skin is susceptible to aging just like every other part of the body, there are steps everyone can take to maintain healthy skin throughout their lifetimes. Dermatologists, including those from the American Academy of Dermatology, share tips on how to care for and protect the skin so it looks beautiful and functions properly.

- Use sun protection. One of the key ways to care for the skin is to protect it from the sun. Over time, sun exposure can cause age spots, wrinkles and elevate the risk for skin cancer. Always use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher. Apply generously and be sure to reapply every two hours or more if you will be swimming or perspiring.
- Stay away from tanning beds. People mistakenly think that using tanning beds is safer than sitting out in the sun. However, tanning beds emit harmful UV radiation that can cause skin cancer just like the sun. The AAD says one indoor tanning session can increase the risk of developing melanoma by 20 percent. Use self-tanning products instead for a golden glow.
- Quit smoking or never begin. Smoking makes the skin look older and contributes to wrinkles. Smoking narrows the tiny blood vessels in the outermost layers of the skin, decreasing blood flow to the skin and making the skin more pale, says the Mayo Clinic. Smoking also depletes oxygen in the skin and can damage collagen and elastin, the fibers that give skin its elasticity and strength.
- Avoid an overload of products. Many dermatologists suggest their patients stick to the basics daily, which includes a mild cleans er, moisturizer and sunscreen. Drinking plenty of water also helps the skin. Exfoliating the skin once a week can help remove dead skin cells, but don't overdo it, which can lead to excess oil production and breakouts.
- ~ Select the right products for your skin type. Choose products that pertain to your skin type, which may be sensitive, normal, dry, oily, or a combination thereof.
- ~ Don't forget the lips. Many people treat their entire faces but then do not address the skin on their lips. Skin cancer can form on the lips, so use a lip balm that has an SPF of 30 or higher. Petroleum jelly can add moisture to the lips if they feel dry.
- Visit a dermatologist. A dermatologist is an expert in many conditions of the skin, hair and nails. He or she can perform an annual examination to look at the entire body and determine the health of skin, and identify any moles or spots that may be of concern.
- Check your own skin. People are advised to pay attention to their skin and look regularly for new spots; spots that are different from other spots on the body; moles that itch, bleed or change color; and any other things that seem not quite right.

Taking care of the skin throughout the years can help a person look and feel his or her best.

As women enter perimenopause and begin the transition that will ultimately lead to menopause, many doctors prescribe hormone pills to help regulate menstruation cycles and ease certain symptoms. Compared to regular birth control pills that contain 30 to 50 micrograms of estrogen, a doctor may suggest a low-dose pill that contains between 10 and 35 micrograms of estrogen. These levels can be increased as needed. WebMD says that, in addition to preventing pregnancy, which can still occur in perimenopause, low dose pills often regulate heavy or irregular menstrual periods and may offer protection from ovarian and uterine cancers. The pills also may prevent bone loss, which leads to osteoporosis. ItÕs important to note that contraceptives come with an elevated risk for breast cancer and blood clots, particularly for those with a history of heart disease and breast cancer. So doctors should be consulted about the pros and cons and women should initiate an open and honest dialogue with their physicians to avoid any complications.

For at least thirty years I have been an admirer and student of the beliefs and practices of the ancient Maya of Central America. I have traveled to, climbed, and entered many of their pyramids in Mexico, Guatemala, and Belize. Their knowledge of the number of days in a year was only milliseconds different from the atomic clocks of today--365.242 days. Amazing! They were one of the first cultures in the world to establish the meaning and value of the numeral "O." Yet with all this advanced knowledge and wisdom, they never grasped the benefit and the use of the wheel. And though secluded from much of the world and hidden deep in the rainforest, the ancient Mayan Empire flourished long before the coming of Christ halfway around the world. I once dreamed God watched us on some heavenly TV set, sitting on his throne eating bread and drinking wine, while the evil one planned his next diabolical move. A religious scholar I am not, but I have been given a gift. Not a gift of talent or great abilities, but more a gift of curiosity, passion, and desire. In many ways nothing more than a sincere desire to know the how and why of how people think and how things work. You wouldn't be reading this right now unless you had some similar curiosity.

I imagine the Maya of yesterday weren't much different. They, like the Egyptians and many Native American and other cultures around the world believed their ancestors came from the stars. Specifically, the stars in the Orion constellation. Their priests and astronomers turned their gaze to the three stars in Orion's belt. The Mayan, the Aztec and the pyramids of Giza in Egypt are said to be aligned with these same three stars. They kept a constant eye on the sky. And when an object that looked like one of their deities--"Kukulkan" (feathered serpent)--was spotted, it was easy to see how that object would be revered and worshipped.

Would a winged object that flies, like . . . let's say an airplane or a spacecraft fit that description?

I would have to say, "yes."

There have been many civilizations throughout history that have testified and recorded witnessing strange flying objects they couldn't explain or identify. 

Treat yourself to grilled lobster

Lobsters weren't always a delicacy. In fact, lobster was once known as "the poor man's chicken," and it was largely eaten by the lower classes and was even fed to pigs in colonial times. Lobsters can be green, yellow or even bright blue. They get their red hue after being cooked.

Lobsters are a great source of heart-healthy omega-3 fatty acids and boast 28 grams of protein in one cup. If you skip the butter, lobster only has around 96 calories and about two grams of fat per three-and-a-half-ounce serving. It's delicious prepared in various ways, including on the grill. Try this recipe for "Lobster Grill" from "The Reading Terminal Market" Cookbook" (Camino Books) by Ann Hazan & Irina Smith.

Lobster Grill (Makes 4 servings)

4 live lobsters, 11/4 to 2 pounds each

Marinade

- 3/4 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup fresh lime juice
- 2 1/2 tablespoons garlic, mashed 1/2 cup chopped cilantro
 - cup chopped cilantro Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste Lemon wedges (optional) Clarified butter (optional)




Split lobsters through head and almost through tail, enough to open wide. Wash out chest cavity and crack claws.

To make the marinade: In a bowl, combine the oil, lime juice,

garlic, cilantro, salt, and pepper. Set aside.

Rub marinade over lobster, allowing excess to drain off, and let sit 10 minutes.

Prepare grill or barbecue. Grill, shell side down, for about 3 to 5 minutes. Turn over and cook another 2 minutes, or until done. Serve with lemon wedges and/or clarified butter, if desired.

Common conditions that affect dogs

Taking care of man's best friend is a priority for all dog owners. That's evident in the amount people invest in their dogs over the course of their furry friends' lifetimes. A 2023 study from MarketWatch Guides found that the lifetime cost to own a labrador retriever in the United States is \$28,801, which shows the lengths dog owners will go to in an effort to ensure their pets' health and happiness.

Preventive care is one way dog owners can protect their pets' long-term health. Ensuring dogs stay up with their vaccinations and scheduling routine well visits are part of preventive care. Recognition of common conditions that affect dogs is another component of preventive care. Such knowledge increases the chances dog owners can spot issues before they escalate into something that can pose a threat to dogs' long-term health. With that in mind, the ASPCA[®] notes the following are common illnesses that affect dogs.

- ~ Diabetes: The American Veterinary Medical Association reports that diabetes occurs in female dogs twice as often as male dogs. In addition, the AVMA notes that certain breeds may be predisposed to the condition. Dog owners can speak to their veterinarian to see if their dog is predisposed. The ASPCA[°] notes signs of diabetes in dogs include changes in appetite, excessive thirst/in crease in water consumption, weight loss, lethargy, and cataract formation or blindness.
- ~ Cancer: The AVMA estimates that nearly half of all dogs over the age of 10 will develop cancer. The ASPCA[®] notes that hereditary and environmental factors can contribute to the development of cancer in dogs, so it's important for dog owners to keep an eye out for symptoms of the disease. Such signs may include lumps, swelling, persistent sores, abnormal discharge from any part of the body, bad breath, and rapid, often unexplained weight loss. Sudden lameness, lethargy, stools that are black and tarry, loss of appetite, and difficulty breathing, urinating or defecating are some additional symptoms of cancer in dogs.
- ~ Canine parovirus: The College of Veterinary Medicine at Cornell University notes that canine parovirus (CPV) is a highly contagious viral disease. Unlike other conditions affecting dogs that tend to strike when dogs are older, CPV typically affects dogs between six and 20 weeks old, though it can affect mature dogs as well. Symptoms of CPV include lethargy, depression and loss or lack of appetite. The CVM notes that sudden onset of high fever, vomiting and diarrhea also are indicative of CPV infection. The ASP CA notes that CPV can be transmitted to people, animals or objects that come in contact with an infected dog's feces.
- ~ Ringworm: Ringworm is caused by a fungus that can infect the skin, hair and nails of a dog. The ASPCA[®] indicates ringworm is highly contagious and can be passed from dogs to humans. Skin lesions on the head, ears, paws, and forelimbs are some signs of ringworm in dogs. Patchy, crusted, circular bald spots that appear red in the center is another sign of ringworm, which will not necessarily produce any symptoms in dogs. Preventive care for dogs includes studying up on common medical issues that can affect man's best friend. More information about these and other conditions is available at aspca.org.
