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

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

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8 ways to honor veterans

Millions of people make considerable sacrifices to protect the freedoms of their fellow citizens. According to the Pew Research Center and data from the Department of Veterans Affairs and the U.S. Census Bureau, there are currently more than 18 million living veterans in the United States. The 2021 Census counted 461,240 veterans in Canada, according to Veterans Affairs Canada. The term "veteran" refers to a person who served in the active military, naval, air service, or space service and was discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable. In the U.S., there are actually five types of protected veterans, according to the Vietnam Era Veterans" Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974. Under VEVRAA, a veteran may be classified as a disabled veteran, recently separated veteran, active duty wartime or campaign badge veteran, or Armed Forces service medal veteran. Veterans deserve respect and admiration all year long, but also get their own holiday each November. Veterans Day celebrates veterans' patriotism and willingness to sacrifice and serve. This Veterans Day, people can consider these eight unique ways to honor the veterans in their community.

- 1. Attend events. Organize or participate in local Veterans Day celebrations, such as parades and ceremonial events.
- Get involved with veterans' affairs. Support veterans by volunteering with organizations that assist them, such as the VA, local veteran's groups, VA hospitals, or charities dedicated to veteran services.
- 3. Petition for veteran speakers. Reach out to schools, scout troops or other groups and arrange opportunities for veterans to share their stories and contributions. Learning about the sacrifices these men and women made can heighten individuals' appreciation for veterans.
- 4. Support the families of veterans. Reach out to veterans' families, who also must make sacrifices and concessions. Anything from shopping, babysitting, doing chores, or making a meal can help the families of veterans.
- 5. Make a donation. If finances allow, make contributions to reputable charities that provide services for veterans like those that offer mental health counseling or job placement services. If there isn't a charity that fits with your vision, begin one.
- 6. Hire veterans to work. If you are a business owner or hiring manager, consider hiring veterans for open positions at your company.

 It can be challenging to re-enter the workforce after service, so make it known that
 your firm welcomes veterans.
- 7. Offer personal acknowledgements. Take the time to speak to veterans and thank them for their service. If possible, when dining out, ask the server if you can pay for the meal of a veteran who also is dining that day.
- 8. Don't forget the fallen veterans. Although Memorial Day is designed to honor those who lost their lives through military service, people still can honor the fallen veterans on Veterans Day by sharing stories or placing flags at veteran cemeteries.

Veterans Day is celebrated on November 11, marking an opportunity to express one's gratitude and support for the scores of veterans who have served honorably.

Did you know?

Children and young adults enter foster care for a variety of reasons, including neglect, abandonment or abuse. When these children are no longer able to live safely with their families, agencies look to provide safe care, often with a goal of pairing children with adoptive parents and families. According to AdoptUSKids.org and the most recent federal data, currently there are more than 400.000 children in foster care in the United States. Among those children, approximately 117,000 are waiting to be adopted. The Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption-Canada says more than 30,000 children are waiting to be adopted from foster care in Canada. The organization Considering Adoption indicates roughly 20,000 children "age out" of foster care each year and are not adopted. Prospective adoptive parents should begin the process of adoption as soon as possible, as the Office of Children and Family Services says the legal process of adoption, from application to finalization, can take six months or more.

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





Did you know?

In an era when consumers are increasingly asked if they want to tip when paying for goods or services, a recent survey has found that many American consumers still adhere to conventional wisdom when leaving a gratuity in restaurants. A YouGov survey released in June 2024 found that 62 percent of Americans tip between 15 and 20 percent when they dine out at a restaurant. Though 15 percent was long the standard when tipping at a restaurant, the YouGov survey indicates more diners are tipping at the higher end of the 15 to 20 percent range. Among survey respondents, 35 percent indicate they typically leave a tip of 20 percent, while 27 percent indicated they typically tip 15 percent. And 20 percent seems to be the best restaurant workers can expect, as the survey indicated only 4 percent of diners tip at 25 percent.

Gustave Flaubert's French Hot Toddy Serves 1

ounces apple cider 2 2 2 ounces calvados

ounces apricot brandy ounces heavy cream

Ground cinnamon for garnishing

ln a small saucepan, heat apple cider until warm. Remove from heat. Add calvados and apricot brandy, stirring to combine. Pour into a heatproof glass. Pouring in a circular motion, slowly add cream, allowing it to settle on top. Garnish with the cinnamon.

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Pecan pie makes a perfect dessert this Thanksgiving

2 tablespoons flour 1/4 teaspoon salt

teaspoon pure vanilla extract



- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F.
- Spread pecans along the bottom of the prepared pie shell.
- 3. In a large bowl, mix the remaining ingredients and pour over pecans. The pecans will rise to the surface of the pie.
- 4. Bake for 60 to 65 minutes until the filling has set. Pie is done when the center reaches 200 F. Pie center when lightly tapped should spring back. Remove pie from oven and let cool on a wire rack for at least 2 hours.

5. Serve.

Subtle signs a pet might have cancer

Researchers have made considerable progress in understanding the spread and development of various forms of cancers. In fact, millions now go on to live long lives after successful treatments, even though much about the disease remains a mystery. While cancers that affect humans garner substantial attention, the disease also can be diagnosed in pets. Pets can develop neoplasia, which involves the abnormal growth of cells or tissues in the body that form into a neoplasm (tumor). A tumor can be benign or malignant. Malignant neoplasms can be unpredictable and grow at various rates and spread to other parts of the animals' bodies. When malignant neoplasms are present, then the pet is considered to have cancer, says the American Veterinary Medical Association. The National Cancer Institute says crude estimates of cancer incidence in pets indicate there are roughly six million new cancer diagnoses made in dogs and a similar number made in cats each year. Although sometimes the signs that an animal is unwell are readily apparent, often cancer may produce only subtle symptoms that are challenging to distinguish and may overlap with other health issues. Here are some signs to watch out for.

- ~ Weight loss: Unless a pet is on a specific weight loss regimen or has increased exercise significantly, a sudden drop in weight could be a sign of cancer.
- ~ Appetite changes: If appetite suddenly increases or decreases, that may be a red flag for cancer. Pay attention to the eating habits of your pets.
- ~ New growths or bumps: The presence of new growths on a pet's body should be checked by a vet. Not all lumps are cancerous, but pay attention to lumps that grow, don't go away or change in shape.
- ~ Behavioral changes: Pet owners get to know the dispositions of their companion animals. When a pet that is normally boisterous becomes lethargic, withdrawn or less playful, that could be a sign of illness.
- ~ Bathroom habit changes: Dietary factors or eating a foreign item in the yard can affect a pet's bowel movements, but so can

illness. Pets struggling with urination or defecation or those exhibiting changes in urine or stool may be sick with cancer.

- Unusual bleeding or discharge: If abnormal bleeding from the nose, mouth or rectum is present, or if the animal has unusual discharge from the eyes or ears, that could be a warning sign for cancer.
- Swollen lymph nodes: Pets' lymph nodes are located beneath the jaw, in front of the shoulders, on each side of the chest, and on the back side of the legs. Swollen lymph nodes may be an indication of an illness like cancer.

The cause of most cancers in pets is not known and, therefore cannot be easily prevented. It is important to keep up with routine well visits for pets so that vets can catch cancer at its earliest stage when it is the most treatable.



Did you know?

According to the National Canine Cancer Foundation, certain dog breeds are more likely to develop cancer than others. The NCCF notes that data supports the notion that genetic characteristics contribute to higher rates of cancer, though more research is needed to understand precisely which factors are behind a greater cancer risk. The Merck Veterinary Manual notes that Golden Retrievers, Boxers, Bernese Mountain Dogs, and Rotweilers are more likely to develop cancer than other breeds. Cancer is a more notable threat to dogs, particular purebred canines, than some dog owners may recognize. In fact, the NCCF reports that 25 percent of all purebred dogs die of cancer. Those figures are even higher among purebreds that live beyond 10 years, as 45 percent of such dogs are likely to succumb to cancer.
















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
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
